Critical Matters

Ongoing	
Funding for students on Work Integrated Learning (WIL)/ Placements	Update: The weekly stipend of \$100 is confirmed and PR Release has been published.
Cost of transport	Update: Campaign has been launched, and the petition has over 2,500 signatures in a week. We aim to push this further and reach 10,000 signatures. Working closely with AUSA.
Elections	International Students being unable to run for Vice-President roles due to Visa and law requirements. AUTSA sits with the problem of not allowing all AUT students the opportunity to run for representative roles. Discussions with AUT to take place to find a potential solution. The idea of a scholarship has been raised.
Increased cost of tertiary education for students	AUT has confirmed 6% fees increase for students in 2026.



AUTSA Membership AUTSA CRM progress to be rolled out to ensure we are capturing membership.

Student Representative Council

Update:

On 9 July, members participated in a mid-year workshop designed to re-energise the team, identify student community challenges, and brainstorm ideas for the remainder of the year. The day included interactive activities, meaningful discussions, and concluded with team bonding at an escape room, which received very positive feedback for fostering connections beyond the formal meeting space. The SRC also played a major role in the AGM, splitting into three themed teams for a friendly competition to bring the most attendees through referrals—congratulations to the Blue Team, "AGM Avengers," for the win. Alongside these events, the SRC held its monthly meeting to discuss ongoing advocacy and initiatives, including transport issues, study spaces, ASR training, disability advocacy support, the Project Navigator follow-up, and student communications policy. Additional agenda items included an AGM debrief, upcoming elections, a Tech Central proposal, event planning, and addressing academic pressure concerns. Overall, July was a month of strong engagement, collaboration, and tangible progress toward enhancing the student experience.

SRC Report Feedback:

- Positive engagement from the SRC mid-year workshop and AGM challenge, fostering strong team spirit.
- Some reps experiencing burnout and needing guidance on balancing commitments.
- Delayed academic feedback raised as a concern by students.
- Unwelcoming treatment for City Campus students accessing facilities after hours.
- South Campus facing unfair UbiPark ticketing issues.
- DSS cancellations and lack of leadership impacting student support.
- Minimal engagement from Māori students with AUTSA events; need targeted outreach.
- Wellbeing Week campaign in development with scope for wider SRC promotion and collaboration.

AUTSA Board

Update:

- Work through Market Research from AUT Surveys.
- AGM: The AUTSA 2025 AGM was a huge success, with strong engagement and vibrant energy throughout the day. We had 68 students pre-register, 60 sign up on the day, 108 new members join, and representation from 28 clubs. Attendance stayed steady with at least 50 students present during the meeting, and we gave away 50 AUTSA bags before starting. Post-AGM, over 200 servings of kai were enjoyed, and we gathered 20+ valuable feedback submissions. Massive thanks to our sponsors, Student Representative Council, clubs, AV team, Board members, staff teams, and all volunteers who made this possible. This record-level turnout and engagement is a testament to everyone's dedication—an incredible way to wrap up the year.

August and late July has been quite eventful in terms of engagement as we had our AGM, VP and Presidential candidate debates as part of elections for SRC 2026. The response was very positive as many students turned up for both the events

Purpose

What is this item about?

The purpose of this agenda item is to inform SRC members about AUTSA's current contribution to Student Job Search (SJS), now \$12,000 annually, reduced from \$20,000, and to facilitate discussion on whether to continue this level of funding or consider reallocating it to other AUTSA services.

Student outreach

What specific student issue or opportunity does this item address? How is your represented student community impacted?

This item focuses on employability resources available to AUT students. SJS is a national service helping students find jobs, accessible regardless of AUTSA funding. The discussion centers on whether AUTSA's current financial support adds value or could be used more effectively elsewhere.

Impact

Why is this relevant to the SRC and AUTSA?

This topic is relevant to AUTSA and the SRC for several reasons:

- AUTSA's contribution supports SJS, though students retain access without it.
- AUT has an employability Lab that we need to consider
- AUTSA also operates other services such as Tautoko (food pantry, breakfast, financial assistance), advocacy, clubs, and student media
- Redirecting funds may benefit services with greater student demand or urgency, enhancing overall student support.

Proposed outcome

What outcome are you hoping to achieve with this item? Informing the SRC, discussion with the SRC, asking for approval, etc.

This agenda item aims to:



- Ensure SRC members are well-informed about the implications of continuing or discontinuing the \$12,000 annual contribution to SJS.
- Support a decision-making process, either to maintain current funding, adjust it, or allocate those funds differently.

Your Agenda Item

Background & Context

- SJS is a not-for-profit student employment service founded in 1982 and was independently operated by student associations across New Zealand. It's now a separate organisation with an independent board and student advisory committee. It receives over 90% of its funding from the government, with AUTSA contributing a minor portion.
- At AUTSA, SJS is one of several student services delivered through the compulsory student services fee, alongside advocacy, clubs, media, and Tautoko

Current Funding Status

 AUTSA's contribution to SJS has decreased from \$20,000 to \$12,000 per annum starting in 2025. Students continue to have access to SJS regardless of this funding.

Option A: Continue Funding at \$12,000

- Signals ongoing support for a nationally coordinated student employment service.
- Maintains relationship and goodwill with SJS.
- Supports student employability in a broader ecosystem.

Option B: Redirect Funds

- Potentially boost other AUTSA services with higher direct student engagement, such as Tautoko, advocacy, clubs, or student media.
- And maintain transparency with students: access to SJS remains.

Considerations

- Service Continuity: SJS continues to operate without AUTSA's full funding.
- Student Needs: Services like Tautoko directly address financial hardship and wellbeing
- Strategic Alignment: How AUTSA can best allocate limited resources to maximize student benefit.
- Transparency is key and will need to be done with students and SJS.
